An article has been making the rounds here in the church office this week. Its title is *Wishing You Had an Easy Job, Like Working at a Church*. Someone found it in a book, *Stuff Christians Like*, and the staff has been enjoying it and passing it among themselves.

The article is illustrated with a line drawing of a road winding its way through a meadow of flowers and past prancing unicorns and gently floating butterflies, to a country church over which stretches a lovely rainbow. Getting the idea? It begins, “Don’t you wish you worked at a church? That would be such a dream job”. The article goes on to point out how working at a church can’t seriously be considered a full-time job because, other than a few hours on Sunday, what else do you do? Plus, you get loved up all the time and people whole heartedly accept what you do and how you do it. You never get mean emails, explains the article, but instead you spend your time opening “thank-you notes and sunshine emails and gift baskets with delicious cheeses and spiced meats all day long.”

I wish. So do the people I work with, whom by the way, I almost never see holding blocks of cheese and spiced meat in their hands or from whose offices flow warm sunshine and the lilting sounds of pan flutes. What I do see a lot of is very dedicated people, often working many hours and spending countless evenings and weekends on the job for one particular reason: They love Jesus. A lot. And they’re sold out to him and to his people. And they consider it a profound privilege, every one of them, to serve Jesus. And they know how blessed they are to not only get to serve Him, but to get paid for doing it!

The article, of course, is tongue in cheek from beginning to end. That’s why everyone on the staff enjoyed it. Because we all know a lot of pastors and church staff for whom their congregations are perpetual war zones, filled with cranky people who wouldn’t help if you poked them with a sharp stick, members who are convinced that a church staff’s primary job is to make the membership comfortable in their

ministry consumption, people whose greatest joy seems to be suggesting that the church staff does not work hard enough. I've been in congregations like that, where it seemed the measure of success was if you could get through the week with a frustration level that stopped just this side of producing tears.

But that, I'm glad to say, is *not* Christ Lutheran Church. I've been amazed lately at the new ministries that are beginning, the sense of energy that seems like it is bubbling up everywhere, the joy that permeates this group of people, all spearheaded by you. You, congregation, are doing the ministry. You are providing leadership. You are instigating new programs. Over and over again you are the ones stepping up to the plate. As a staff we may not spend entire days opening tenderly written fan mail, but you are liberal and consistent with your encouragement and support. We may not always see butterflies in the air as we enter the building, but we do see the smiles on your faces, we do feel the warmth of your embraces, we do sense the depth of your love. It may sometimes, like with you, still feel like a job we have to drag ourselves to (almost never, to be truthful), but you make sure that we never feel alone in our ministry, never feel like we have to beg you for help, never feel like we're being taken for granted. You are a blessing to us. We are so glad we work here; it's fun.

What an awesome team we are, staff and congregation. To my many colleagues in professional ministry I would say, "Wishing you had a great congregation, like working at Christ Lutheran Church."

What's your favorite worship song or hymn?

I was asking that question just for fun. Some people gave me the traditional answers, 'How Great Thou Art' and 'Amazing Grace'. Some were more contemporary like 'I Can Only Imagine' and 'Here I Am.' And there are songs that have become timeless as they have been redone by new artists. Check out Owl City's version of 'In Christ Alone' (tinyurl.com/2e3qk9f) or David Crowder's 'O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing' (tinyurl.com/6e54mve) or Audio Adrenaline singing 'It is Well with my Soul' (tinyurl.com/4fdtd9). (Just type the tinyurl into your web browser and you'll get a link to the song).

¹ Sing to the LORD a new song,
for he has done marvelous things;
his right hand and his holy arm
have worked salvation for him.

These great songs get into our hearts, souls and minds and we can't stop singing them. We are wired to sing. One of my favorite verses is 'Make a Joyful Noise' (Psalm 98:4). Notice that it doesn't say 'make a perfect noise' or 'make a precise noise' it says that we should make a joyful noise.

⁴ Shout for joy to the LORD, all the earth,
burst into jubilant song with music;
⁵ make music to the LORD with the harp,
with the harp and the sound of singing,
⁶ with trumpets and the blast of the ram's horn—
shout for joy before the LORD, the King.

This is because in worship we should not hold back. The whole point is that we should sing to the Lord with all of our soul, not just as much as we feel comfortable with. Worship transforms us. And by worship, I'm not just talking about the hour we have together on Sunday Morning. (70 minutes if whoever is preaching really gets into it). I'm talking about the time we take and devote to God.

⁷ Let the sea resound, and everything in it,
the world, and all who live in it.

I know what you are thinking: I don't have any more time to go to church. I'm already doing everything, Worship, KoK, a bible study. I'm not asking for any more time on the CLC campus. I have a challenge: redeem your commute. Here is what I mean; you have time in your car. Some of you have a lot of time in your car as you go down the 405. Take that time and sing, worship and pray.

⁸ Let the rivers clap their hands,
let the mountains sing together for joy;

When we sing and worship, it changes who we are. Think of how when we sing praises to God, even in the midst of trouble and traffic, it changes our attitude. I can remember more than once when I have been in worship and I don't feel like praising God. I might be tired or upset about something, but the act of praising God changes who I am from the inside out. God doesn't need our praise. He will always be God. He will always be the Almighty. But we need to praise him for our sake. It reminds us that he is *our Lord and Savior*.

So what are you singing? What is the song in your heart as you walk through this world? Take the time and worship as you go through things. Try it for a week. Let me know what happens.

At 5 a.m. while the clients at our local shelter are still asleep, clients of the Sylmar shelter are awakened and sent out into the darkness without anything to eat for breakfast.

On December 30th members of our Santa Clarita Valley Chapter of Thrivent sponsored a delicious meal at the Armory, complete with awesome music provided by The Hylands and Bingo games to amuse everyone. A dreary hall filled with hungry and downtrodden individuals and families came alive in music, surprised smiles and humbling expressions of gratitude. We were blessed with memories and experiences that raise our spirits beyond anything we could have imagined. "Please come back!" "We had fun!" These were the remarks we heard over the applause as we headed to our cars.



Won't you join us as we work together to provide another warm meal at the Armory on February 3rd? Perhaps you could donate a gallon of milk, a big can of refried beans or a dish of Spanish Rice. Bricks vs. Stones

I was listening to a radio broadcast recently when I heard a rabbi, Daniel Lapin, talking about the biblical reference to using bricks to build the Tower of Babel, and how that is a perfect analogy of the contrast between communism and capitalism. His point being that in communism the principle is to make everyone equal by artificially shaping them in to a uniform mold, taking away from those who have more, adding to those who have less in an attempt to even everything out from the outside, like a man-made brick; whereas in capitalism, the principle is that each unique individual, shaped by God like an uncut stone, can find a place and a purpose, whether they are very small or ungainly and huge. In his estimation, the Tower of Babel was an attempt by mankind to do it “their way”, to produce something with their own hands that would help them reach God. An attempt that God thwarted by disrupting the building and confusing their language (Genesis 11:3-9).

It is interesting to note that post-Tower of Babel ancient Israelites were not supposed to build anything out of bricks, they were supposed to make use of natural uncut stones, especially when building altars to God like Joshua’s stone monument (Joshua 4:4-7), constructed after successfully crossing the Jordan River.

Although Rabbi Lapin is Jewish, and he was using this illustration to shed light on a political concept, the “uncut stone” analogy has stuck with me. I can’t help but see a direct connection to the New Testament scriptural reference to Jesus as the “capstone” or “cornerstone” (Acts 4:11), and to each of us believers as “living stones” (1 Peter 2:5), being built into a spiritual house, and then finally to my job as Connected in Christ Coordinator here at Christ Lutheran.

Never has it been more apparent that each individual is unique, gifted and shaped by God, and possesses something



only they can offer, than in the preparation for our Christmas Eve presentation this year. I was in charge of coordinating this important event and it was simply staggering to realize how many pieces there were to this puzzle! There were videos to film which meant locations, equipment, manpower, scheduling, talent, editing, etc. There were sets to make which meant artistry, know-how, construction, materials, etc. There was music which meant recruiting, rehearsals, recordings, etc. There was a drama which meant casting, costuming, commitments, etc. There was a great need for technical help which meant training, troubleshooting, mic checks and monitors, etc. There was writing and re-writing, there were platforms and greenery, there were sound

systems, there was filming on a green-screen, there was original music, there was the task of keeping everything running smoothly backstage, there was a new lighting system to program, there were last minute cast changes, there were 15 bales of hay, etc., etc., etc. And each stone managed to fall into place. Each individual, with their unique talent, gift, offering, was able to bring something only they could bring.

It is like that with all we do here at Christ Lutheran, and it is my job to help each of you find that spot where you can nestle perfectly among your fellow “living stones”. What is your unique, individual, gift? What is the offering that only you can bring to the table? Where is that partially-constructed wall that needs you to fill in the gap? Where is that pile of stones that you will so neatly fit in to? I can help you find it.

As this new year gets underway, I invite you all to really seek that place where you will become part of the spiritual house. Find your niche, fill a gap, and meet a need, in service to our God, the great creator of each unique, individual, stone.

A Teenager's Experience

Throughout our country's history, our servicemen and women have carried our country's colors into the most fearsome of circumstances. From fighting for independence during the American Revolution, to storming enemy held beaches during World War Two, to fighting the Taliban in Afghanistan, the soldiers of the United States have continuously proven their valor in the field of fire. The sacrifices our fighting men and women have endured have given both the soldiers and civilians alike a new found respect and admiration for our great nation.

I have had a similar experience which has given me a new found respect for our country and the members of the armed forces. My experience in patriotism has been with the Hands and Hearts ministry of Christ Lutheran Church. I started with Hands and Hearts in the Seventh grade simply because I needed community services hours for a school project. I asked around to find different opportunities for service hours, when my grandmother, Joy Werner, came to me with the proposal of packing care packages for the service men and women who are deployed overseas.

Originally, when I was packing food and other supplies for the Soldiers and Marines fighting in Afghanistan and Iraq, I thought that I was just doing it to get my community service hours. But while I was packing, I looked at the items that they wanted to be sent to them, and I realized that these were similar to items I would ask for. I came to understand that

experience helped me to come to terms with the fact that I was not just packing things to get my community service hours, I was doing it to help keep my country free and safe.

Over the past few years, my experiences with Hands and Hearts has allowed me to truly understand the sacrifice that our fighting men and women have given for this country in every war we have fought, servicemen of the United States have

proven their courageousness, while giving more of themselves than nearly all of us have to give in our entire lifetimes. My work through Hands and Hearts has opened up my eyes to this, for which I am very grateful. I have been able to give back in a small way to those who have given so much. As a final note, it was Hands and Hearts that helped lead my family to become members of Christ Lutheran Church.

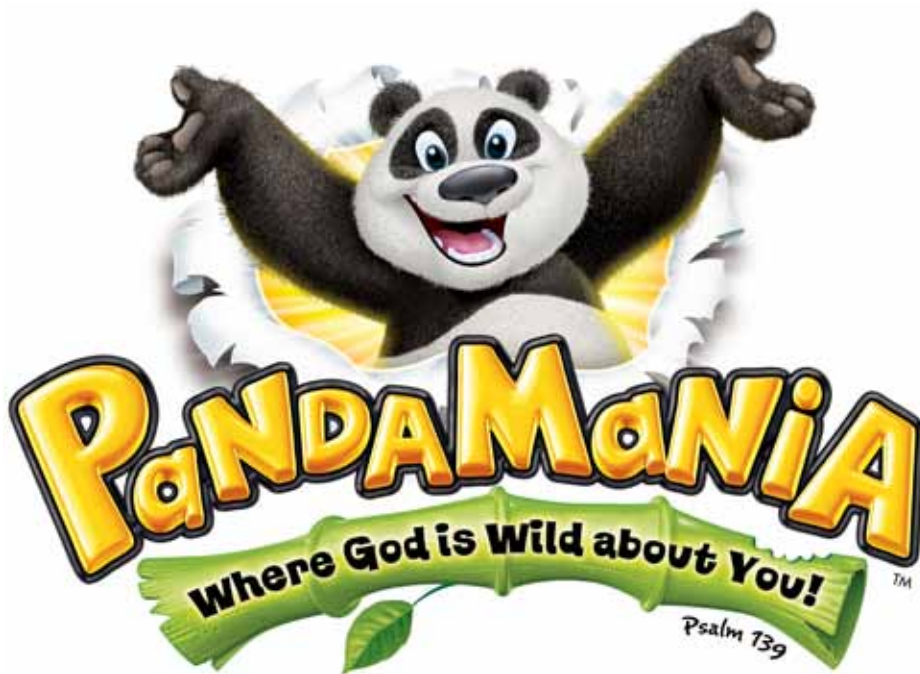

Preschool News



About a month ago we were contacted by the Greene family informing us of a very dire situation concerning their little girl Libriti who graduated to kindergarten this past summer. Their 5 year-old daughter was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoma Leukemia (ALL). The doctors had also discovered something they didn't expect, a rare abnormal chromosome called "Philadelphia Chromosome (PH+)," which is only found in 5 percent of ALL cases and linked with only a 20% survival rate.

As part of our preschool family, we are concerned with not only Libriti getting better, but the emotional and financial pressure that the family is going through. Tami and I could not just sit still and not help. We met with one of our parents, Jackie MacDougall, to brain storm ways to raise money for this family quickly. Soon after, Kim Stevens jumped on board to help us with any graphics. Jackie had a Facebook site up and running within hours called **For the Love of Libriti**. The site is taking off and we hope the social network will help us spread the word and donations will follow. Large or small, we know it will all make a huge impact on this family. Since Russ and Senta are both self-employed and their daughter desperately needs them at her side we are asking the community to please take the time to make a difference for this precious little girl.

After Pastor Joe heard about the situation, he quickly had Teri look into what the church could do. Prayers were answered as a check for \$1,000 was donated from the Good Samaritan Fund. Tami and I presented this to the Greene family last Friday. It was so nice to have a brief visit with them and to see our little Libriti. The family was so touched. Russ went on the Facebook site and wrote the nicest letter about the donation and his feelings of thanks to the church. The family also expressed how Chapel time with Pastor Joe and Kathleen has laid an important foundation for Libriti to lean on in this difficult time.
