I saw an article in the *LA Times* recently about what happened to the pink dress and pill box hat that Jacqueline Kennedy wore on November 22, 1963, the day that President Kennedy was assassinated. The story was about what happened to that iconic dress, which she wore all through that terrible day, including in the famous photo of Lyndon Johnson being sworn in as President, Mrs. Kennedy by his side, looking shocked and grief stricken and forlorn, her dress now carrying her husband's bloodstains. It turns out that the dress was never cleaned and is kept in a climate controlled room in the National Archives away from public view, where it will remain, at the request of Caroline Kennedy, for 100 years. Accompanying the article was another famous photo of President Kennedy and his wife when they arrived at Love Field in Dallas earlier in the day, both of them smiling and resplendent in the late November sunshine, no hint of the tragedy that awaited them and the nation in a few short hours.

That picture fascinates me though I have seen it countless times. It haunts me because what was about to happen would change their lives and indeed the life of the country, even as they moved toward that moment with no knowledge of what awaited them. I find myself thinking about the days and hours as they ticked away, bringing them ever nearer a catastrophe of which they were blithely ignorant. What would they have done differently had they

known what was coming? Would the smiles that have been frozen on their faces now for nearly a half century been there had they realized what was about to come? I've had friends who have died suddenly; members of our own congregation have been with us one moment and gone the next. And I find myself thinking at times about those last few days and hours of life before everything changes.

But I wonder sometimes about that week... Jesus knew he was going to die and rise again, he said as much to his disciples more than once. But did he know it would be that week? Did he know it would be Friday? If he did know, how did it change what he said and did in those final days

Jesus entered Jerusalem for the last time on a Sunday. By Friday afternoon he would be dead. We have a tendency to rush through that last week, skipping directly from Palm Sunday to Maundy Thursday and the Last Supper. Some of us don't even pause there, going straight from the Triumphal Entry to Easter Sunday with barely a break in between. But I wonder sometimes about that week... Jesus knew he was going to die and rise again, he said as much to his disciples more than once.

Thoughts from Pastor Joe, continued

But did he know it would be that week? Did he know it would be Friday? If he did know, how did it change what he said and did in those final days? How much did his disciples suspect? How did it feel to know the last grains of sand were slipping through the hourglass?

During the season of Lent this year we are going to spend Sunday mornings reading through the final week of Jesus' life. He entered Jerusalem Sunday morning... but what happened on Monday? What about Tuesday... what was on his mind on Tuesday? Join us for our Lenten Series, *Following Jesus on His Final Journey*, as we walk with Jesus through the closing days of his life. Follow his steps. Stand in his shadow. Hear the conviction in his voice; witness the courage of his deeds. And claim his promise.



As I write this we now have 15 people registered to go to the Holy Land in November. We will walk where Jesus walked and visit the important sites of his ministry, including Bethlehem, Jerusalem, Galilee, the Jordan River, the Dead Sea, the Mount of the Beatitudes, Gethsemane, and many other stops. There is still room for more pilgrims. If you are interested, brochures are available in the church office, or speak to Pastor Joe. We'd love to have you join us.

From Pastor Mike

Back when I was still in college, my church had bumper stickers that said, ‘start seeing miracles!’ They were printed up and put everywhere. And as the church grew, it became one of those things that you would see everywhere. It seemed like you would always be driving behind somebody who had one of those brightly colored bumper stickers attached to their rear bumper.

I remember one time I got questioned by a friend of mine. He was asking what miracles we were supposed to be seeing. Not really wanting to go out on a limb, I talked about mundane ‘miracles’ like sunrises and kids and generic stuff like that. Looking back, I realize what a lame answer it was. It was like another



time when I heard somebody explain that the miracle where it says that Jesus feeds five thousand with a couple of fish and five loaves of bread was really just everybody sharing all the food that they had brought and it was a miracle of how they opened up their picnic baskets and shared.

Honestly, what is the point of ‘miracles’ like that? The other day, I was told the story from the time Fatimid Caliph Al-Muizz ruled Egypt, about a thousand years ago. He was often entertained by debates between religious authorities. During the debate, the leader of the local Christians was challenged with the words of Jesus in Matthew 17:

Jesus replied, “Because you have so little faith. I tell you the truth, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, ‘Move from here to there’ and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you.”

The Caliph, having never heard these words before, asked if Jesus had indeed said this. When he learned that Jesus had then said this, He told the local Christians that he wanted to see this happen. If it didn’t, they would all die by his sword.

After three days of prayer and fasting, the congregation gathered at the foot of the mountain. When Abraham, their leader, made the sign of the cross, the people rose to worship God, and so did the mountain. Tradition tells that the mountain moved three times and moved so far that the people could see daylight under it. The Caliph converted to Christianity that day.

Do I know that this story happened just as tradition tells? I can’t say for sure, I wasn’t there. But I do know that is the kind of God I believe in. Reading through the bible, I hear stories of seas being parted, food rained down from heaven, and people being raised from the dead. When I read Christian history, I constantly see stories like this. People raising the

dead in the name of Jesus, rivers stopping, and things that nobody can explain. Miracles are more than just pretty sunrises.

Why are we so afraid to step out in faith on these things? Have we become so blasé to the supernatural that we just go through the motions? I don’t think it is rationalism or science that has made us this way. I think it is that we don’t expect to see things. We don’t have the idea in our head that God would do things like that. What is one outrageous thing that you are going to pray for? What is something that only God could do that you need to see desperately? Step out in faith and pray for that. Is there a friend or relative who needs to know Jesus? Pray for their heart to be changed! Pray for that person. It might take years, but step out in faith for that miracle. The mountain may just jump up into the air.

Human. Humble. Humor.

My daughter Grace is in sixth grade. It is the year they begin to study word origins so she is currently working on Greek roots. Coincidentally, there has been a concept brewing in my mind, something to do with these three words: human, humble, humor. They come from the same Greek root, hum, which means “of the soil or earth”. The New Testament was originally written in Greek, so this connection could have significance to us Christians. What do these three words, rooted in “the dirt”, say to us?

Let’s start with “human”. Adam, the first human, was literally made from dirt. As it says in Genesis 2:7,

The LORD GOD formed the man from the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being.

So, originally we were all created, by God, in His image, from the dirt. In fact, that’s how we got our name! Who knew? On Ash Wednesday we will be reminded that we came from dust, and to dust we will return.

We are constantly being told “believe in yourself”, “do whatever feels right to you”, or, “you need some ‘me’ time”. The entire society has become “me-centric”. The idea of humbly submitting to God’s will is quite distasteful and even insulting to us.

Which is where being “humble” comes in. The relationship of human to God should be a humble one. Humility is a critical characteristic to develop as a Christian. God is the creator, we are the created. However, you’d never know that if you took a look at our culture today. We are constantly being told “believe in yourself”, “do whatever ‘feels’ right to you”, or, “you need some ‘me’ time”. The entire society has become “me-centric”. The idea of humbly submitting to God’s will is quite distasteful and even insulting to us. We think we know better, actually better than God does, as to what we should or should not do. The Bible is considered only a vague outline, something to be casually consulted in time of need. We will certainly take comfort from it in a crisis, but we will NOT submit to its authority...we’re too smart for that! In fact, we are now in a position where we



can boldly tell God how he created the universe and how long it took, we can tell Him how He created us! It is actually quite absurd to me, the baby believer, that we humans think that human knowledge and understanding can trump God’s Word. Even the most brilliant human cannot hope to even approach the vast knowledge and unfathomable creative power of the One who created all things, seen and unseen. It’s kind of funny to even consider it.

Which finally brings me to “humor”. We need to, as humble humans, be able to laugh at ourselves. And to be able to bring laughter to others. Think of how the Gospel is brought to children, with smiles and fun. How the truth of Jesus Christ can be conveyed by true enjoyment of life and living. There is no reason to be a “serious” Christian, God gives us joy and freedom. Let’s not be so wrapped up in our personal issues, let’s put them in perspective, see the humor in situations, get outside our own little “me” boxes!

As Lent approaches, I pray God helps me to be a humble human. Jesus, the only Son of God, came to earth and sacrificed Himself to renew our broken relationship with God. He endured pain and suffering, and even scathing humiliation, for me...for you. And because of that we should not feel proud or arrogant. We should fall at His feet and call Him Lord. It is Him who we should take seriously, not ourselves.

Human, humble, humor...can you see a connection?

Isaiah 66:2

Has not my hand made all these things, and so they came into being?” declares the LORD. “These are the ones I look on with favor: those who are humble and contrite in spirit, and who tremble at my word.”

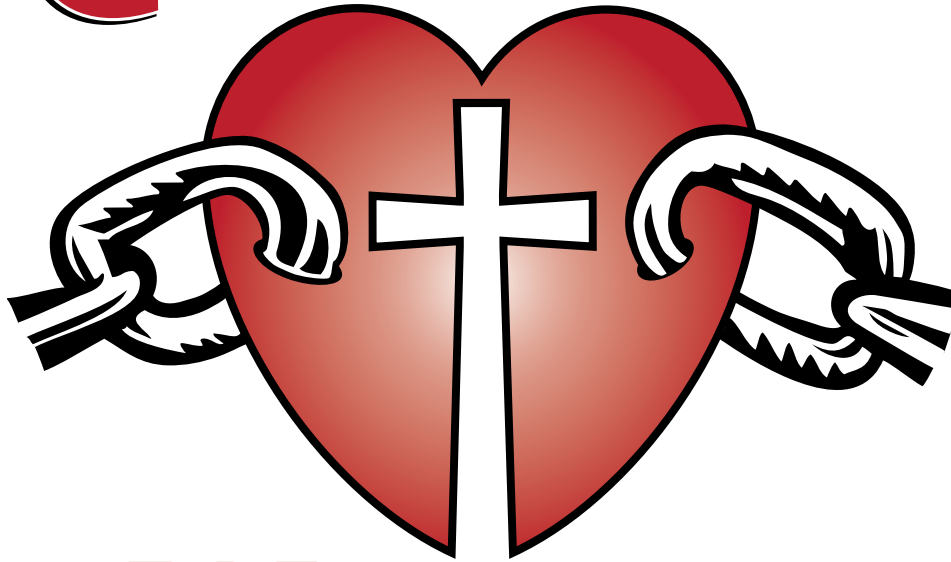

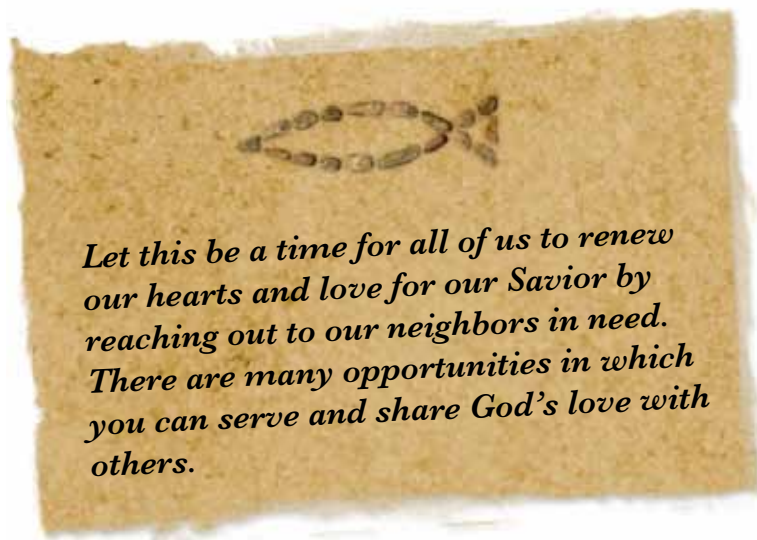

At Impact on Tuesday nights we have just finished a study about pains and struggles that we all experience in life. We want our teenagers to realize that they are not alone as they face the “hurts” of life. The Bible offers wisdom and counsel to help us through these situations.

One of our goals, as we looked at Ecclesiastes 4:9-12, was to encourage our young people to realize the benefit of talking about their experiences with trustworthy friends and family members. We want them to discover that God gives us the strength to share what we are going through with others—instead of bottling up our emotions, thoughts, and feelings.

I would encourage you to talk with your teenager about the reality of painful times in life—including during the teenage years. Discuss your role, and how you are always available as a listener. Let your student know that you are there to just listen and offer support. Also, take a few minutes to pray about anything that might be happening right now in your teenager’s life.

If you’re looking for a little help to get going, here are some questions that could generate dialogue:

Why do we sometimes try to isolate ourselves or avoid our friends when we’re hurting?

What are some of the best ways to comfort a friend who’s experiencing painful times?

Which is easier for you: helping someone else or asking someone else for help? What does this say about the way you handle your own pain?

As a leader in our church, I’m committed to supporting the foundations you are putting into place in your child’s life. If there’s anything I can do to help, please let me know.

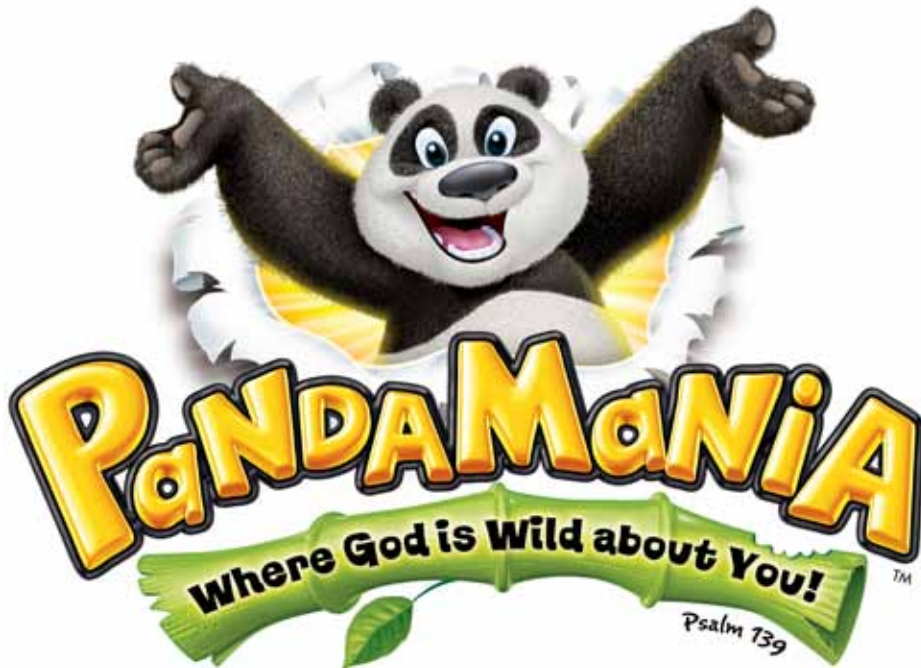
Junior High
