Thoughts from Pastor Joe

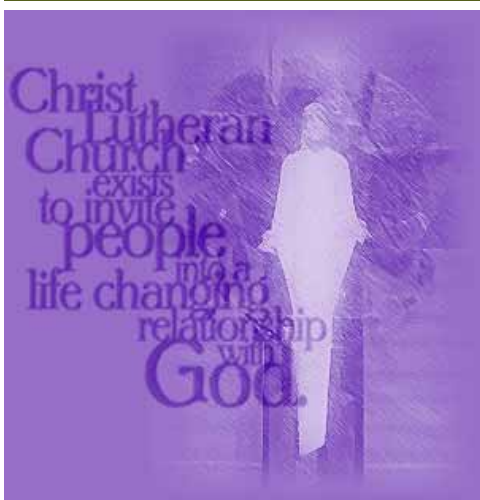
Sometimes things get in the way. Sometimes things can become a distraction that causes us to take our eyes off what is most important. Sometimes we can get caught up in what seems to demand our attention in such a way that we fail to fully focus on what is crucial.

Our second annual Compassion Weekend is coming up on May 1 and 2. Like last year, it is a weekend we have set aside in which our whole congregation – every last person...that means you – will be asked to move out into the community to serve it with and for the love of Jesus. We want to be a congregation that is known for what Jesus is known for... touching lives, serving needs, loving people and loving God. That is crucial. We can't do that from within the walls of 25816 Tournament Rd. We can only do that by being a church without walls, being the church in the community. That's what we'll practice on that weekend. Last year we had over 700 people involved in some form of community ministry on the same weekend. I think we can do even better this year, but not without your help.

But that's where the distractions can come in. We all have busy schedules, things that demand our attention, commitments and plans that ask for our devotion. Likely all of them are good and all of them are worthy. But I want to encourage you to keep your eyes on what is most crucial of all, changing our world, even if all we are able to do is change a solitary life for a single day, with the real, powerful, active love of Jesus. Don't let yourself get distracted; serve with us on May 1 and 2.



On another note, some things are going on with our ELCA Southwest California synod that I also consider to fall into the category of distraction. Recently the synod council (the synod equivalent of our church council) voted to "call together the Consultation Committee to address whether or not there is cause for disciplinary action against Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Torrance and Christ Lutheran Church, Santa Clarita and the clergy of both congregations." In other words, a process has begun to determine whether

disciplinary charges will be brought against Pastor Mike and me, and whether charges will also be brought against our congregation. This action was based on our decision in January to affiliate with LCMC while remaining part of the ELCA. Although the ELCA Constitution nowhere prohibits such an affiliation, it is the recent interpretation of the ELCA's Secretary that since the Constitution does not explicitly allow for this kind of a dual affiliation it is prohibited. This is despite the fact that the constitution clearly states that anything that is not expressly prohibited by the constitution is a matter for individual congregational decision. Furthermore, as we have indicated in the past, there are congregations around the country, including in our own synod, who have held memberships in both organizations for years, and have never experienced this kind of response from the synod.

Our church council does not believe our vote to dual affiliate was in violation of the ELCA Constitution. Furthermore, while there is a range of actions the synod could choose to take, the ELCA constitution in article nine makes it clear that no possible synodical action can ever result in the congregation losing its property.

I am sorry I have to share this with you. The synod's logic is truly and unfortunately beyond comprehension and one wonders what exactly their motivation is. Nevertheless, our congregation is moving forward in its ministry. The council has established some very exciting priorities for us as we seek to be faithful to Jesus' call to follow. They include renewed focus on adult study with a focus on Bible study, worship, discipling new believers and new members, and focusing on our young married and young family membership. We are busy reconfiguring our staff to meet those priorities as well as other needs within the life of our congregation. We have begun a focused giving opportunity to supply solar panels for a health clinic in Africa. And all of that is just the beginning. God has given us so much to do; we will not be distracted by synodical actions or clumsy attempts at intimidation. The life and mission of our congregation is secure since it is firmly anchored in the word of God and the power of His Spirit, not in the approval of a synod (Galatians 1:10). While we do not intend to invest any significant amount of time in defending our actions (that would be a distraction from our mission), at the moment we will nominally cooperate with the process as a means of making our position clear and public, and as an encouragement to those congregations who may feel threatened by such actions. We stand confidently, as did Martin Luther in his dealings with the church of his day, because like Luther we stand confident in our risen Lord and in his word.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Words cannot express our heartfelt thanks to all of you for your continued prayers and support on our behalf! It is hard to believe we have been dealing with Jennifer's health issues for almost 7 years now. This last year has been especially difficult for her but we pray that there is a bit of light at the end of the tunnel. As many of you know I was laid off last year and continue to be unemployed. All of this can test most people's faith, trust and patience to say the least. Please know that it is your prayers that keep getting us through this one day at a time. Thank you for the phone calls and visits during this time. We are grateful to Jesus' disciples that came out to paint the trim on the house and repair the roof as well. Christ does work through His people and He is definitely working through all of you! You have taken your call to Christ very seriously. We feel very connected to our Christ Lutheran Church family! You are in our prayers each day. Again we thank all of you so very much!

God, in the Small Stuff

It is like a grain of mustard seed, which, when it is sown in the earth, is less than all the seeds that be in the earth: But when it is sown, it grows up and becomes greater than all herbs, and shoots out great branches. Mark 4:31 & 32 KJV

I love Jesus' parables and this is one of my favorites – The comparison of the Kingdom of God to what we can see and relate to on earth. He taught so simply.

When I had signed up as a lead for Compassion Weekend, one of the projects I knew I wanted us to work on again was the Bear Kits projects. It was successful last year but for children in a hospital setting and for gift baskets given out at camps for disabled children, I thought it was a little too big – 18" big. I looked at this bear for a few days then opened up the pattern and thought there's got to be a better way; too many pieces to cut out and sew. I'm one for simplifying things, and that includes projects. So, in my mind I started drafting out a pattern, then putting it to paper. I had created an 8" bear – that is, me and the Lord.

I'm not brilliant, and I'm the first to admit that I seek our Lord's council on many issues and projects. This was a big one for me. His teachings are so simple – nothing massive, no big words. That is why I thought of the comparison of the mustard seed and the Kingdom of God. God is in the small stuff too, as in creating the smallest seed on earth.

I looked at the finished 8" bear and compared it to the 18" and thought "God is in the small stuff, even in helping me create a smaller bear". I apologize if I'm repeating myself here, but isn't that what we should do all the time – realize that what we do or achieve shouldn't be based on the size, but take joy in the small things that we accomplish in His name and to His glory.

I sometimes think that we have the tendency of comparing what we do for Jesus with the achievements of others that it doesn't count. The smallest things we do in His name matter as much to our Lord. Your small gifts/achievements takes root and branches out just like the mustard seed.

Lord Jesus, thank you for loving me, and my smallest accomplishments.

Hands and Hearts



Did you know that some troops in Afghanistan go months without a shower? Army Major Ryan O'Conner, now in Kandahar Province, said that during a previous tour, his Soldiers fought half a year without so much as a dip in a creek. Shortages of drinking water also affected their combat operations. We hear bits and pieces now and then, just enough to know that conditions can be far worse for our troops than we may realize. Sometimes - particularly toward the end of a tour - a soldier might unleash a barrage of information which he kept to himself for almost a year. Only then do we get an inkling of what they endure.

Charles is "my soldier." I've carried his prayer card and prayed for him every day for months. Like most of the sol-

diers we support, he is not serving his tour at a large base; Charles is at a forward operating base, surrounded on all sides by a mostly invisible enemy. I know very little about this Marine - at least I didn't - until I read his letter.

From Charles Mabry:

Another month of our boots covered with the dirt of Marjeh, Afghanistan. We've fought, we've cried, we've slept in the cold and we haven't slept at all... I sit here tonight in the dark on a cot with my laptop and satellite running off battery power. My boots are off and my feet stink. We haven't showered in over a month; I've changed my shirt 4 times and my socks maybe 5 times.

I've heard bullets fly by my face; I've felt the dirt rain down upon me from IEDs and RPGs. I've fallen asleep to the sound of gunfire night after night. I've watched our Marines bodies carried through the streets, grasping on to their last breath... praying the black hawks arrive in time. I've made good friends with men who aren't here anymore. I'm tired, dirty and I'm ready to come home, but I look around at the Marines around me... smiling and laughing. Young men sent to the edge of the world to do things you should never see. Young men that give you [the] ability to sit at home and enjoy the company of your wife, your kids, your car, your phone.

These young men don't ask for much, a bottle of water, a 4-year-old MRE, a place to sleep and a Marine to watch their back. I can't stress to you enough that these Marines here in Marjeh, the Marines of 1st Battalion 6th Marines, are the real deal.... This deployment has made me proud to be able to call myself a Marine. This deployment has given me a chance to know how well [sic] of a life I have. But most importantly, this deployment has showed that there's still people who support us.... mail from people like you, sending it to the Marines who need it most, letters from complete strangers saying "Thank you." Boxes of snacks just when you think you couldn't have eaten one more MRE.

I've watched Marines cry after reading the letters we have received. There's something there... it's more than a box, it's more than a letter... it's knowing we aren't here alone. No matter how cold it gets at night, no matter how close those rounds come, no matter how far we move, no matter how lonely we feel when we are in our sleeping bags at night... we know you're there to keep us warm, keep us safe, help us move that extra mile when the pack is just so heavy you want to collapse. For that, I thank you. I wish I had the time and money to come visit...so you could look into my eyes when I say that. It comes from the bottom of my heart.

Hands and Hearts will meet on May 5th at 9 a.m. in room 7 to begin preparations for the May shipment. Our May packing party will be on Tuesday, May 18th at 7 - 8 p.m. in the Fellowship Center and on May 19th at 9 - 11 a.m. For more information, please contact Karolle at 255-3222 or hands_n_hearts@yahoo.com. Women's Mission Trip to St. John's Shelter for Women and Children in Sacramento

Date of Mission Trip: Sunday July 18 – Thursday July 22, 2010

Cost: Not yet finalized but estimated at approx. \$160 plus meals (includes transportation, 4 night's accommodation – 4 women per room, and continental breakfast).

We invite you to come and share the message of Jesus with women and children in need at St. John's Shelter. This is a great opportunity to offer hospitality and show God's genuine care and concern to destitute women and their children, and to learn from them about their hardships and challenges and how we can continue to engage in mission and share the message of Jesus with the women and children at St. John's and at other places where God is already present and calling us to go and serve.

During the three days that we will be spending at St. John's we will plan a daily schedule of activities, including Music/Worship, Crafts, Games, Bible study, Prayer Time and just "hang" time, sharing the experience of shelter living with the women and their children. We will work in the kitchen preparing and serving dinner and lunch, and work in the warehouse sorting clothes in their "boutique" and stacking shelves with food donations.

A phrase I've heard a lot recently is "Go big, or go home". While I understand that it means you shouldn't settle, but give your all to whatever you're doing, I sometimes think it could be interpreted as meaning unless you do something loud and showy, it doesn't count. I think we have all learned the lesson that bigger isn't always better be it a house, a car or even *gasp* a TV. In these tough economic times, we're remembering that the simple things are what matter. The mission team that went to Africa told us how happy the people of the Central African Republic are even though they have so little and just surviving the first few years of life is a challenge. We'll soon begin a project to help provide them with solar panels so they can have a source of dependable power, something we're fortunate enough to take for granted.

Sadly, images of victims of disasters - both natural and man-made - have been on the news a lot lately. There's much that needs doing in the world. I think most of us feel like our contributions are too small and insignificant to really make a difference. But we would be wrong to think that. We need to ask ourselves, who did the angels announce Jesus' birth to? Some shepherds! Some of the lowliest members of society in those days. When Jesus was calling his disciples, who did he call? Mostly some fishermen! Definitely not the most learned or accomplished men. It would be easy to say that they didn't bring much to the party, but look at the impact they had on the world because they were willing to trust in Jesus and follow where he led.

I LOVE the movie Wall-E. If you've seen the movie, you know that people have left Earth because it was so over-run with garbage. Robots like Wall-E were supposed to clean everything up so the people could return. But the job was too big, and 700 years later, Wall-E is the only one left. But, instead of giving up the job as hopeless, every day he sets out to make his part of the Earth a little better. He hums as he works compacting trash and stacking it neatly. I love this movie because Wall-E is little and rusted and banged-up, yet he still manages to change the lives of everyone he meets—human and robot—for the better. He makes both the people and the robots change their thinking and look at their world with new eyes. He is willing to protect and love, even when it seems he might not get anything in return. I think it's a perfect allegory about the gifts of the Spirit. Wall-E might not seem like the likeliest of leaders, but he was able to inspire the others to follow him; they broke out of their complacency and established thinking to enter a new world.

As we look forward to Compassion Weekend, I hope that maybe you'll think of the small wonders you've experienced in your own lives and know that it isn't always a matter of "Go big or go home". We can be a blessing by using the gifts we've been given.

October 31 -Confirmation Sunday at the 11:00 am service.

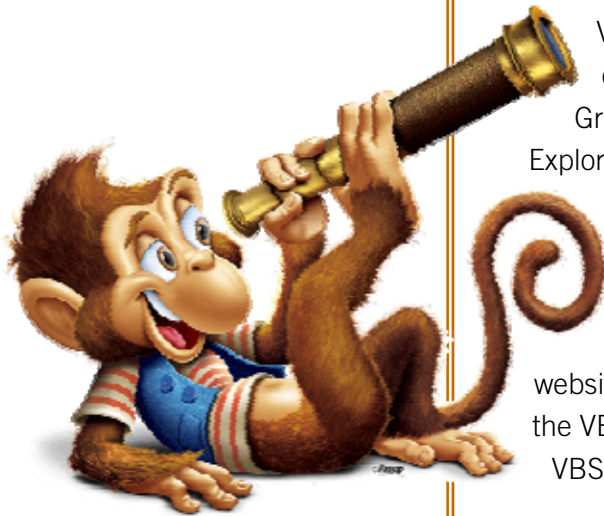
Arrive at the church in your robe and ready for pictures at 10:00 am.
